The papers gave an impression, that CAS can do health research and the multidisciplinary nature of the various CAS departments became their strength, it was like "unity and strength in diversity"-inspired issue that we are still proud of until now. It was also to challenge our younger generation of CAS scientists, and that they be encouraged to engage in research as we provide support so they can publish. So we thank again the PJHRD, for this important support for CAS and both our young and seasoned authors and scientists by providing us the venue to showcase our work.

To pay homage to PJHRD, this year, we prepared another great line up of articles, venturing on scientific advances including new generation pollutants monitoring and research, functional food development, natural products research and drug discovery, nanoscience research, disaster and behavioral psychology research, biodiversity and radiation science. We are very excited to share them to you as part of our commitment to making health research prosper in the country as our contribution to the world.

The past two years have been challenging research globally due to the pandemic, but it has also opened doors for new partnerships, new collaborations, new research initiatives for CAS and our partners. Be assured that we will once again share our accomplishments, maybe through another special issue next year.

We once again share our gratitude to the PJHRD, may you have continued success and may you still continue to be the beacon of light for young scientists, continuing career scientists and great scientific mentors of CAS, of UP Manila and even beyond the walls of our campus.
