DESAI PRIZE

In 1965, a prominent Suva businessman Mr. Shantilal Desai donated a prize to the Fiji Medical Association to be awarded to a member of the Fiji Medical Association who had done most toward promoting, improving and the aims and aspirations of the Fiji Medical Association and had contributed appreciably to medicine in Fiji. Since then, Mr. Desai has been donating this award and this tradition has been continued by the present owners of the Desai Bookshops, the Native Land Development Corporation. The prize is awarded to a person recommended by a majority of members of the Council of the Fiji Medical Association. It is awarded to a worthy person who has contributed most to the medical profession in Fiji during the current financial year of the Association. This contribution may be clinical, preventive, administrative, educational or to the affairs of the Association. In the event of no person being considered worthy of the award, the donor is informed accordingly and the prize is not donated and becomes part of the funds of the Association, which even course of action is agreed to by the donor.

The prize is worth \$100.



MILTON FRIEDMAN TO INAUGURATE NEW INTER-NATIONAL BODY OF PRIVATE DOCTORS

Independent medical practitioners from around the world will meet in Sydney, Australia, in January 1981 for the inaugural Congress of private and independent doctors.

Named IATROS, the Congress is planned to bring together medical practitioners who believe in the importance of private medical practice, and who are prepared to oppose government and other bureaucratic interference in the patient-doctor relationship.

Professor, Milton Friedman, Nobel laureate well known for his advocacy of private enterprise and of the market in medical practice, will be the keynote speaker.

Chairman of the IATROS Steering Committee, Dr David Cunningham, of Sydney, Australia, said that the organisation had been launched in 1978 following contacts between Australia, U.S., Canadian and British private doctors.

Dr Cunningham is a past-President of the General Practitioners' Society in Australia, the private doctors' group which led the Australian medical profession in halting socialised medicine in the mid-70's.

"The rising cost of health care in the non-socialist

countries has become a political football. People everywhere are misled by socialists into believing in the myth of free medical care," Dr Cunningham said.

"There is no doubt that the bureaucracies in other countries would be happy to control the medical profession. This is what IATROS is all about — an international meeting to consolidate the position of the private physician throughout the free world," he said.

The IATROS Congress will be held at the Sydney Hilton from January 12 through January 17, 1981. Concurrent with the Congress will be the annual conference of the General Practitioners' Society in Australia, at which all IATROS delegates will be welcomed.

January in Sydney is the height of summer, with the city's famous harbour and surfing beaches providing major attractions for tourists.

Through American Express, IATROS delegates will be able to tour other Australian capitals, the Great Barrier Reef and the remote "outback" of the island continent.
